## Call for Papers

This conference is designed to provide quality training for beginning and experienced frontline staff and supervisors, administrators of adoption and foster care and related child welfare programs, and professionals in related disciplines. Priority will be given to information new to the field.

In preparing your workshop proposal, select from one of the following conference focus areas:

## Selection Criteria

Proposals will be rated on their relevance to the conference theme, clarity, originality, ability to be replicated, cultural content, and relevance to the target audience. Special attention will be given to ensuring cultural and geographic diversity and public and private agency representation. Presentations that highlight effective program models, creative policy strategies, and approaches that provide participants with information and guidance that will support and enhance their work in the field are desired.

Those selected will be notified by June 15, 2007. Selected presenters must agree to attend and facilitate their presentations and provide handout materials for workshop presentations.

## Guidelines for Submission

1. Your workshop proposal must include the following components to be considered:
  - A 25- to 50-word description of your workshop for the conference brochure, with a title that reflects the proposed workshop's content.
  - An abstract of your workshop (not to exceed 500 words) that summarizes the proposed workshop's content, describes the presentation format, and identifies the target audience.
  - A 50-word biographical sketch for each presenter identified in the abstract.
2. Proposals must be received by **5:00 p.m. (ET), May 4, 2007**.
