

Chart 1: Number of Catholic orphanages, 1980 - 2019*



Chart 2: Number of Catholic orphanages key regions, 1980 - 2019*







Activities and Results

Win hearts and minds

- 700+ understand need for new approaches
- "Today, everyone speaks the language of family- and community-based care"

Capacity

- 80 scholarships for social work and allied fields
- Hundreds trained in case management, child protection...

Quality of care

- Fewer children in care; improved staff-child ratios
- 100% babies/children's homes legally registered (from 2 to 21)

Charism


- 17 congregations with better prepared sisters
- Charism remains relevant: sisters as leaders

Children

- In 21 babies/children's home: 75% decrease (from 1,207 to 311)
- 4 homes transitioning to new ministries


