




Family-type Care vs Residential Care Costs:






Government expenditure on foster care & residential care 2017 - 2021




Family-type care expenditure, 2017 - 2021

Conclusions

- Total government expenditure on residential care was 1.8 times higher than that on foster care between 2017 and 2021.
- Some of the difference in expenditure on the two services can be explained by the particular profile of the children receiving care.
- Coupled with the number of children receiving care, this difference is explained to a greater extent by **inefficiencies in adapting costs to the number of beneficiaries**.
- Whereas budget data shows that expenditure on both family-type care and residential care increased over the period under analysis, at a greater rate than inflation, **not much can be inferred from it about the adequacy of this expenditure**.
- There is no evidence that savings resulting from the transformation/closure of residential institutions have been **reallocated towards alternative family-type services**.





Structure and Share of Expenses






Personnel-related expenses prevail in all the institutions: 60 - 84%




Expenses for procurement of goods: 11–26%. Higher in the institutions for children with severe disabilities











Annual average cost per child per services

KEY FINDINGS





- The **highest costs** per child are found in the institutions for young children:
- 13,591 18,883 USD per child
- Personnel-related expenses prevail in the structure of expenditure in all the institutions: up to 84%
- The annual average cost per child is increasing in all the 6 institutions, even though in some of them the number of children and staff is decreasing.
- In some institutions, the cost of care has grown by over 50% or has even doubled.



REQUIRED ACTIONS!!!





- Completing the process of deinstitutionalization;
- Moratorium on new entries especially children 0-3 y.o.;
- Optimizing expenses reallocating resources to prevention and support services at community level, family-type services;
- Consolidating the inter-agency cooperation for primary prevention and provision of appropriate and timely support;
- Developing integrated services for children, including inter-budget financial mechanisms;
- Strengthening inclusive education.












Minimum package: expenditure trends








Residential institutions: expenditure trends

FY 2023 Budget: 8.0 million USD







Net present value: health returns



Improvements in health status and life expectancy for children served



USD 20,3 M in long-term returns

Internal rate of return

Moldova increases its spending on a minimum package of social services by an average of 25.5% in the next 5 years



Present value of health returns: 20.3 M USD



Present value of education returns: 62.1 M USD



Internal Rate of Return: 16,6%



Present value of other savings (justice, interior, etc.): 4.1 M USD



Present value of the transition from high cost institutions: 5.2 M USD
