		F. Family environment and alternative care (arts. 5, 9-11, 18 (1) and (2), 20, 21, 25 and 27 (4))
		Family environment
		28. The Committee welcomes the measures taken to provide guidance to families on child rearing and recommends that the State party:
		(a) Strengthen its efforts to ensure that mothers and fathers share equally the responsibility for raising their children, in accordance with article 18 (1) of the Convention;
		(b) Take measures to change the prevalent gender stereotypes concerning the tasks and roles of women and girls in the family and in the workforce.
		Alternative care
		29. The Committee appreciates the important role that monasteries have in the care and
		development of children deprived of a family environment and welcomes the measures taken
		for the modernization of their education curriculum. The Committee recommends that the State party establish an independent monitoring mechanism to ensure compliance of
		monasteries with national policies regarding care, development, education and disciplining of

children. This mechanism should be able to carry out unannounced visits and receive and deal with complaints concerning child abuse or ill-treatment.

Adoption

- 30. The Committee welcomes the enactment of the Child Adoption Act in 2012 and the endorsement of the Child Adoption Rules and Regulation in 2015, and recommends that the State party consider ratifying the Hague Convention on Protection of Children and Cooperation in respect of Intercountry Adoption and ensure that all safeguards are met when children are adopted in countries that are not parties to that Convention.
- H. Education, leisure and cultural activities (arts. 28-31)

Education, including vocational training and guidance

- 38. The Committee welcomes the progress in reaching near universal primary education enrolment and the adoption of the strategic document entitled "Bhutan Education Blueprint 2014-2024". The Committee is however concerned about: ...
 - (b) The construction of "central schools" (i.e., regional boarding schools) replacing schools in rural areas, which provide for children as young as 6 years, and the impact that may have on the child's development and right to family life;
- 39. The Committee recommends that the State party: ...
 - (b) Conduct consultations with communities, parents and children from rural areas on any decision to close rural schools and build regional boarding schools and ensure that the cultural and emotional needs of children away from their homes are adequately met and regularly overseen to ensure their welfare;
- I. Special protection measures (arts. 22, 30, 32, 33, 35, 36, 37 (b)-(d) and 38-40)

Administration of juvenile justice

48. The Committee welcomes raising the age of criminal responsibility to 13 years. In the light of its general comment No. 10 (2007) on children's rights in juvenile justice, the Committee recommends that the State party:...

		III. Data
		Data collection
		6. The Committee notes that the Royal Bhutan Police receive and process cases involving offences against children and records profiles of repeat offenders. It further notes there are no reported cases of sale of children, child prostitution and child pornography in the State party. The



Committee is however concerned about the existing challenges and limitations in collecting data, as acknowledged by the State party itself, including the limited knowledge of children's rights and protection issues and the absence of a comprehensive mechanism for the collection of disaggregated data for child protection and care.

7. The Committee recommends that the State party develop and implement a comprehensive, coordinated and effective system of data collection, analysis, monitoring and impact assessment on all areas covered by the Optional Protocol. The data should be disaggregated by sex, age, nationality and ethnic origin, region and socioeconomic status, with particular attention to children who are at risk of becoming victims of crimes under the Optional Protocol, particularly children from economically disadvantaged situations, children of single parents and children of parents who are addicted to gambling. Data should also be collected on the number of reported cases, investigations and prosecutions carried out and sentences issued, disaggregated by the nature of the offence.

IV. General measures of implementation

Training

- 16. The Committee regrets the limited information on training programmes and activities regarding the Optional Protocol.
- 17. The Committee recommends that the State party develop and implement training programmes on their responsibilities under the Optional Protocol for all professional groups working with and for children, including law enforcement officials, teachers, health personnel, social workers and personnel of childcare institutions, government officials at national and local levels and religious authorities.
