





Overview

- The inter-agency information system supports child protection's activities and more specifically:
 - Family Tracing & Reunification Programs
 - Demobilization Disarmament & Reintegration Programs
 - Programs for other Vulnerable Children
- It facilitates the tracing, reunifications and follow-ups as well as matches between family members searching for missing children and separated children.
- The system also facilitates case management and identifies protection concerns for separated children, children associated with fighting forces and armed groups (CAAFAGs) and other vulnerable children.


Example of Information Gathered on Separated Children




Example of Information Gathered on CAAFAGs




Example of Information Gathered for Other Vulnerable Children



Example of Protection Concerns Gathered




Information Gathered to Monitor Follow Up Visits









Example of Protection Concerns Reports



Benefits:

- Promotes best practices
 - incorporates Child Protection response as a pre-requisite
 - protects data informants and gatherers
 - protective standards in case management
 - data analysis and reporting
- Increases coordination key to successful child protection activities and more critically for successful family tracing
- Facilitates sharing and synchronization of information
 - between agencies
 - cross border tracing
- Streamlines resources for development, maintenance, support and training
- Ability to easily customize the system to meet the countries and programs' specificities







Background

- Within the Inter-Agency Working Group on Separated Children and introduced to the child protection subworking group (Protection Cluster)
- Consortium since 2005
 - Steering Committee UNICEF, SC UK / Alliance, IRC
 - Global coordination and support:
 - Roll-out to country teams with training and ongoing technical support
 - Development of standard data sharing and protection protocols & procedures
 - field driven enhancements
 - Consistent and efficient response to FTR, DDR and other child protection programs and compatibility between agencies and countries
